In this issue I would like to talk about Chevrolet without Corvette?

Sounds like coffee without cream to some folks, but believe it or not, at the turn of the century, General Motors was apparently considering the possibility of making Corvette a brand of its own, according to the recent recollections of Rick Kranz, product editor for Automotive News.

In 2001, Kranz says he was told by then-president of GM North America Ron Zarrella that GM was seriously looking into the expansion of the Corvette line into two models: one with a six-

figure price tag and unique body panels and another with considerably less horsepower. But they were also studying the pros and cons of taking Corvette away from Chevy and creating a separate performance brand (similar to what Chrysler is doing with the upcoming new Viper). It's not as far-fetched an idea as it might sound at first glance. Kranz lists several reasons for considering the switch: Corvette did not fit the value image Chevrolet portrayed. Many Chevy dealers didn't even sell Corvettes. If only selected dealers sold the car, it might be thought of as a more exclusive product. Dealers who were chosen could create an exclusive area

of the showroom to display the car. GM could pick the best dealers who might do a better job of selling the car. GM presumably would want dealers who knew what they were doing to sell and service a car that tops \$100K. As everyone knows, the discussions never went any further. Zarrella left the company within days of his conversation with Kranz, shortly after Bob Lutz had been hired as GM vice chairman and product guru. End of discussion. Of course, the super

I'm glad though GM did not go through with such a hasty bad decision, this would of in my opinion would of destroyed the Corvette and if it would even still be around today? With warmer weather around the corner and for those that put your Corvette into a winter Hibernation, here are a few tips to go over so you can enjoy your car all summer long with minimal issues!

- 1) Clear out the critters. If you haven't ever had the unfortunate experience of finding out the hard way that mice have nested in your car vents, you might be surprised how often this happens. Squirrels, mice and even neighborhood cats think the nooks and crannies in your stored vehicle are great places to bed down or store food. Firing up the engine before checking vents, under the hood and carriage can create a very unpleasant scene and cause your car to stink for months.
- 2) Check all fluids. This includes oil, transmission, radiator/coolant, power steering and wiper fluid. If any of these fluids are low, empty or sludgy, it's time for them to be changed/refilled. Even if most of these fluids are "ok", springtime is a great time to have all these fluids replaced, especially after a winter of being in storage. Check all fluids again after the engine is fired up

With the CB craze dwindling, the last year a CB radio was offered as a Corvette option was what year? And how many Corvettes came equipped with this option? and the car has had a chance to warm up a bit; they might show lower levels or more sludge once the engine has cycled for a few minutes.

- 3) Charge that battery! Hopefully you took a few minutes each month over the winter to allow your stored car's battery to recharge; allowing the battery to fully deplete shortens the battery's overall lifespan. Even if you have kept it well charged over the winter, it's a good idea to allow the battery to fully recharge before heading out.
- 4) Check tires for proper pressure and weathering. Air

can slowly leak out of tires over the winter, and tires that are well-used can also dry and crack due to changes in the air's humidity. Either

of these problems will cause inefficient gas mileage at best, poor alignment, unsafe traction and flat tires at worst. If you're unsure of whether your car's tires are still good or not, bring your vehicle down to the shop and our technicians can help. Remember: when it comes to maintenance issues that affect vehicle safety, it's better to be safe than sorry!

5) Top up with fresh fuel. Octane levels in gasoline drop each month, so if your vehicle has been sitting in storage all winter, by springtime the fuel left in the tank is not much good. This is especially true if your vehicle hasn't had the luxury of being stored in a dry, cool indoor stable. After clearing out vents and charging the battery, your first stop should be the gas station (where you can re-inflate low tires as well).

Corvette Racing Finishes Second and Third in ALMS GT in Sebring

Corvette Racing celebrated the 60th anniversary of the Mobil 1 Twelve Hours of Sebring in style, finishing second and third in the closely contested American Le Mans Series GT class. The final minutes of the 12-hour race saw dramatic shifts of fortune that shuffled the finishing order and propelled both Compuware Corvette C6.Rs onto the podium.

Running third at the start of the last lap, Jan Magnussen passed the No. 71 Ferrari to take



second after the Ferrari and the classleading No. 56 BMW fought for position. Moments earlier, Oliver Gavin passed the No. 155 BMW to secure third on the ALMS podium.

"I really don't know what happened, but apparently the BMW and Ferrari got together," Magnussen said. "I didn't even know that I had passed the Ferrari in the darkness. We were struggling at the end of the race with the track conditions, so second is a huge bonus and a fantastic foundation to build on. Sebring is such a difficult race, and I'm very happy with a podium finish."


